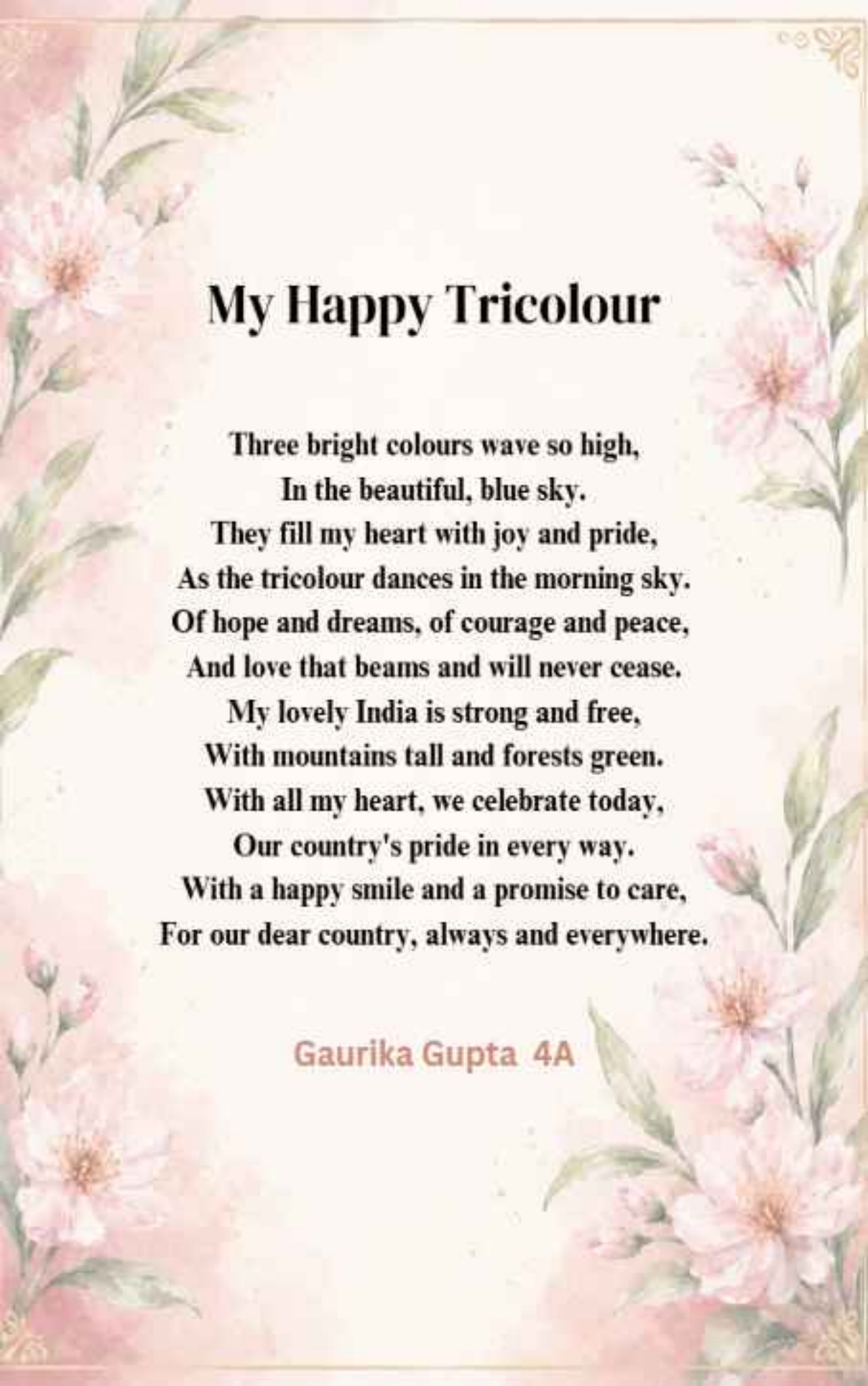

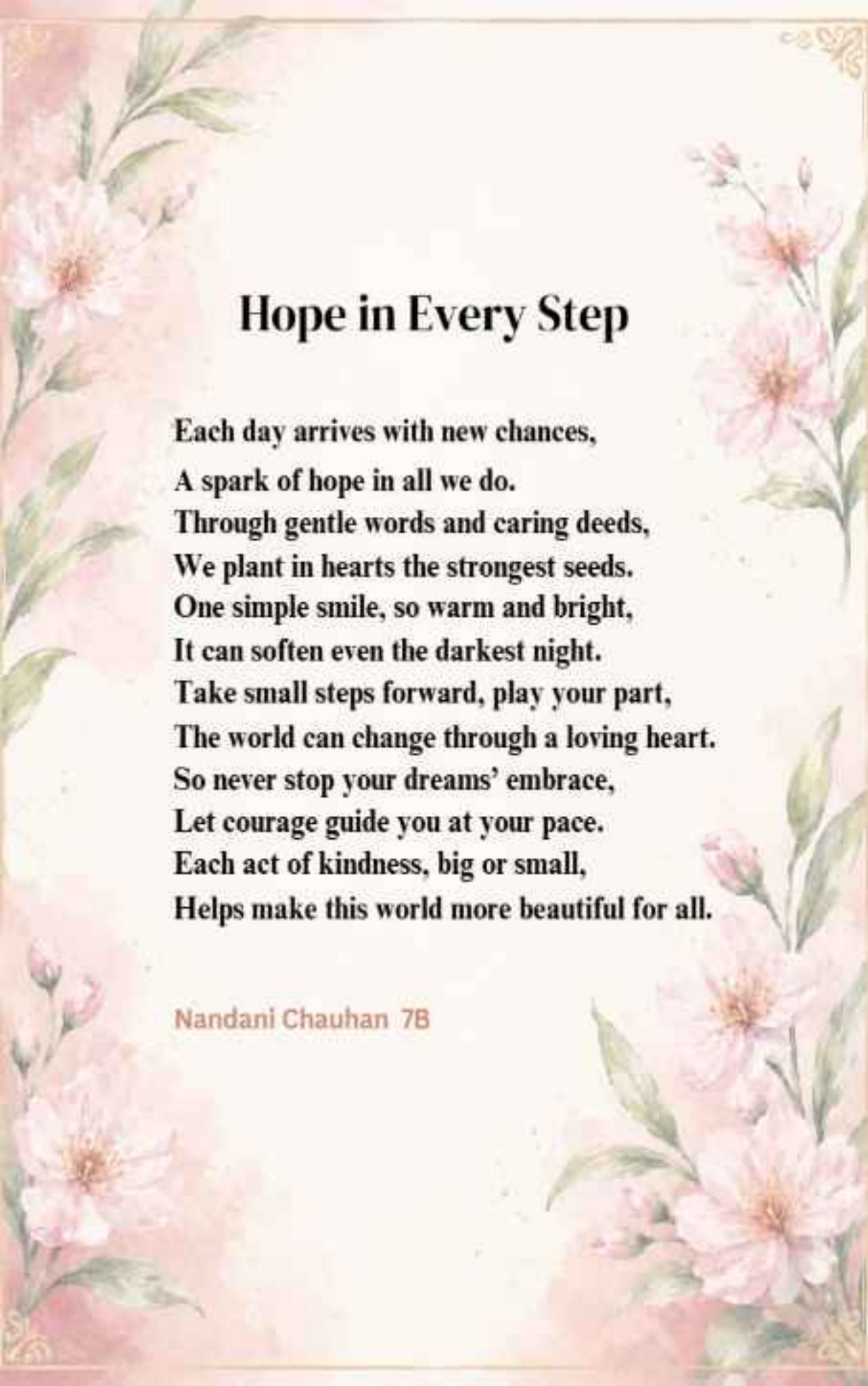

Let love be the path you choose to show.

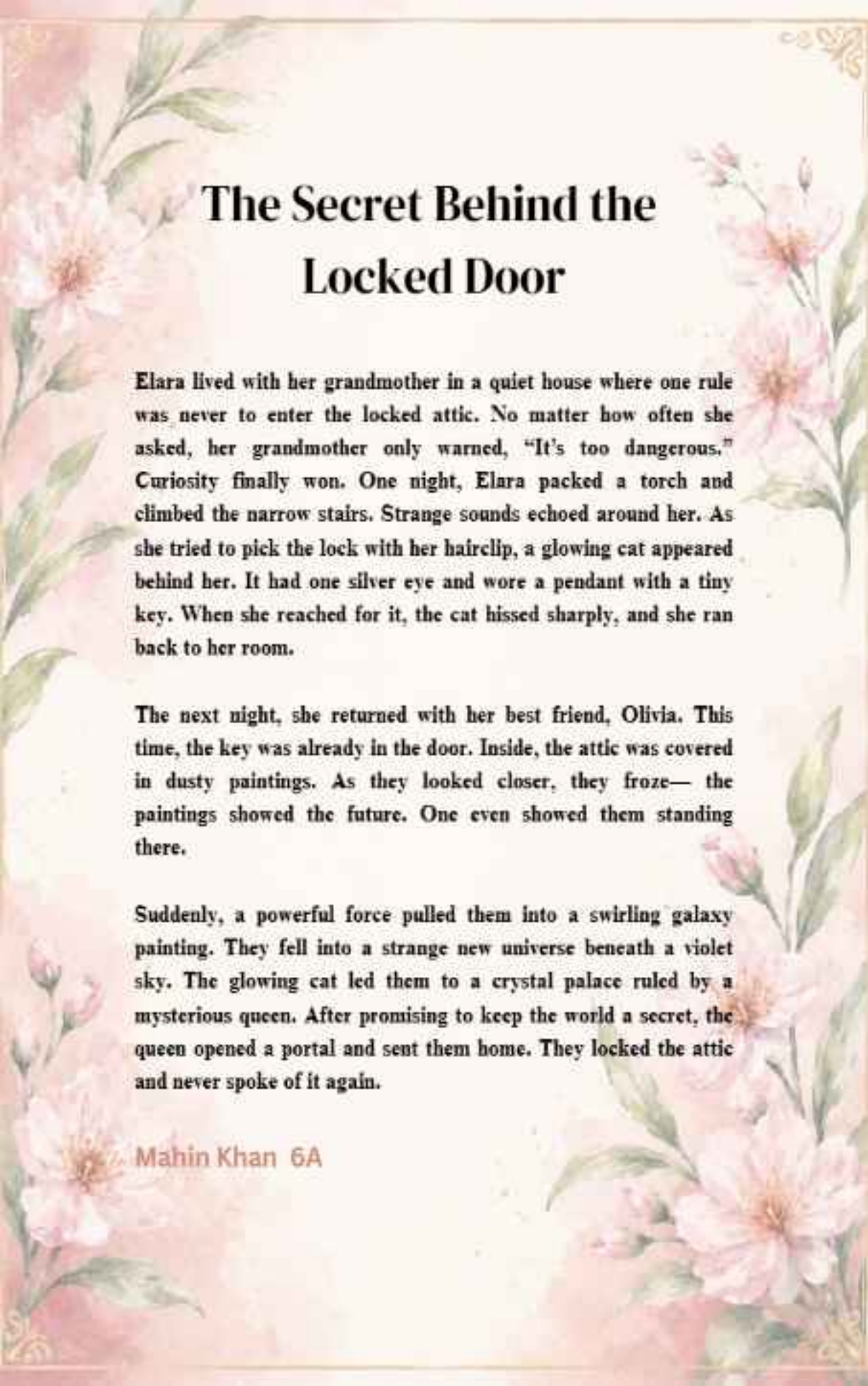

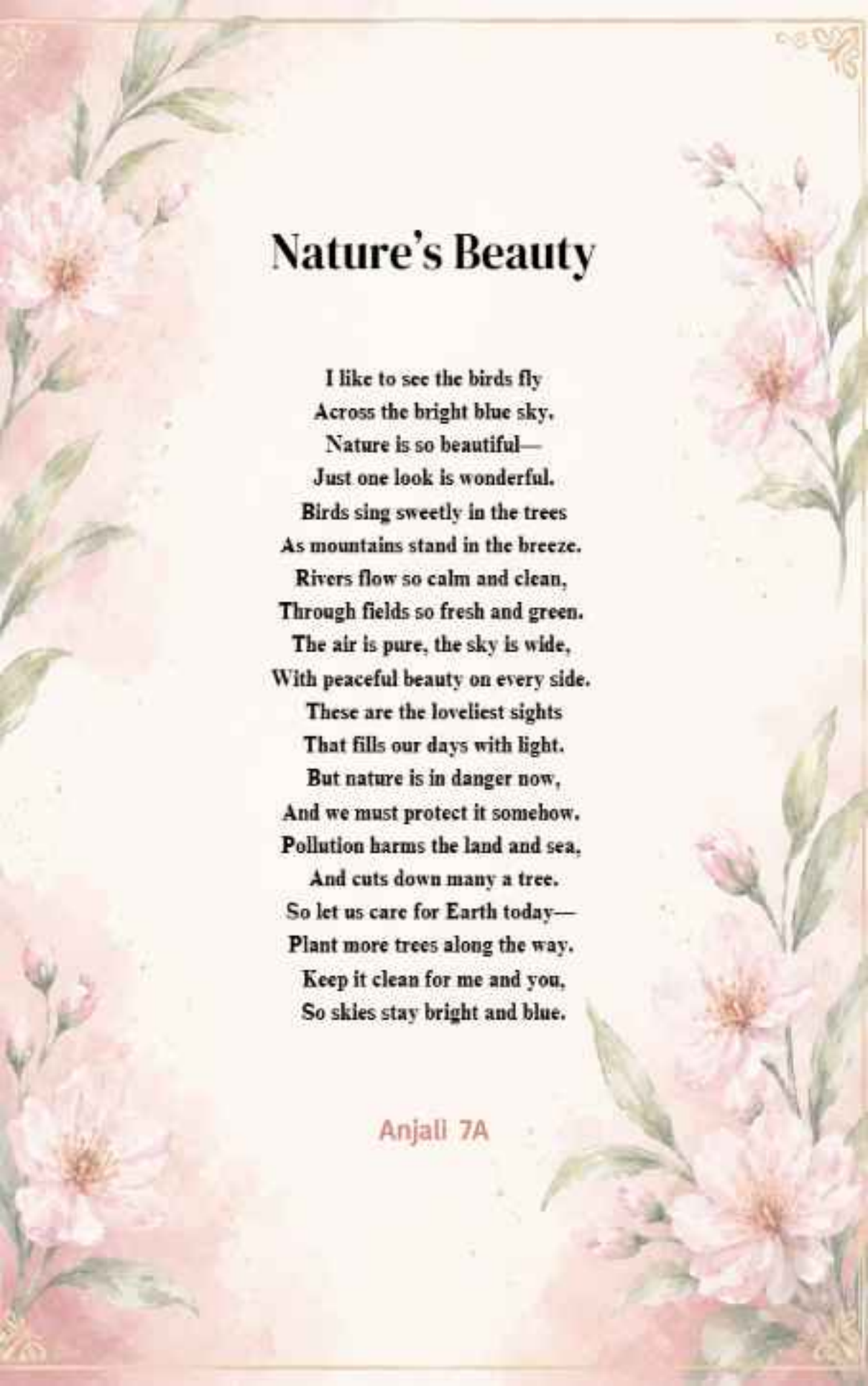
The Secret Behind the Locked Door

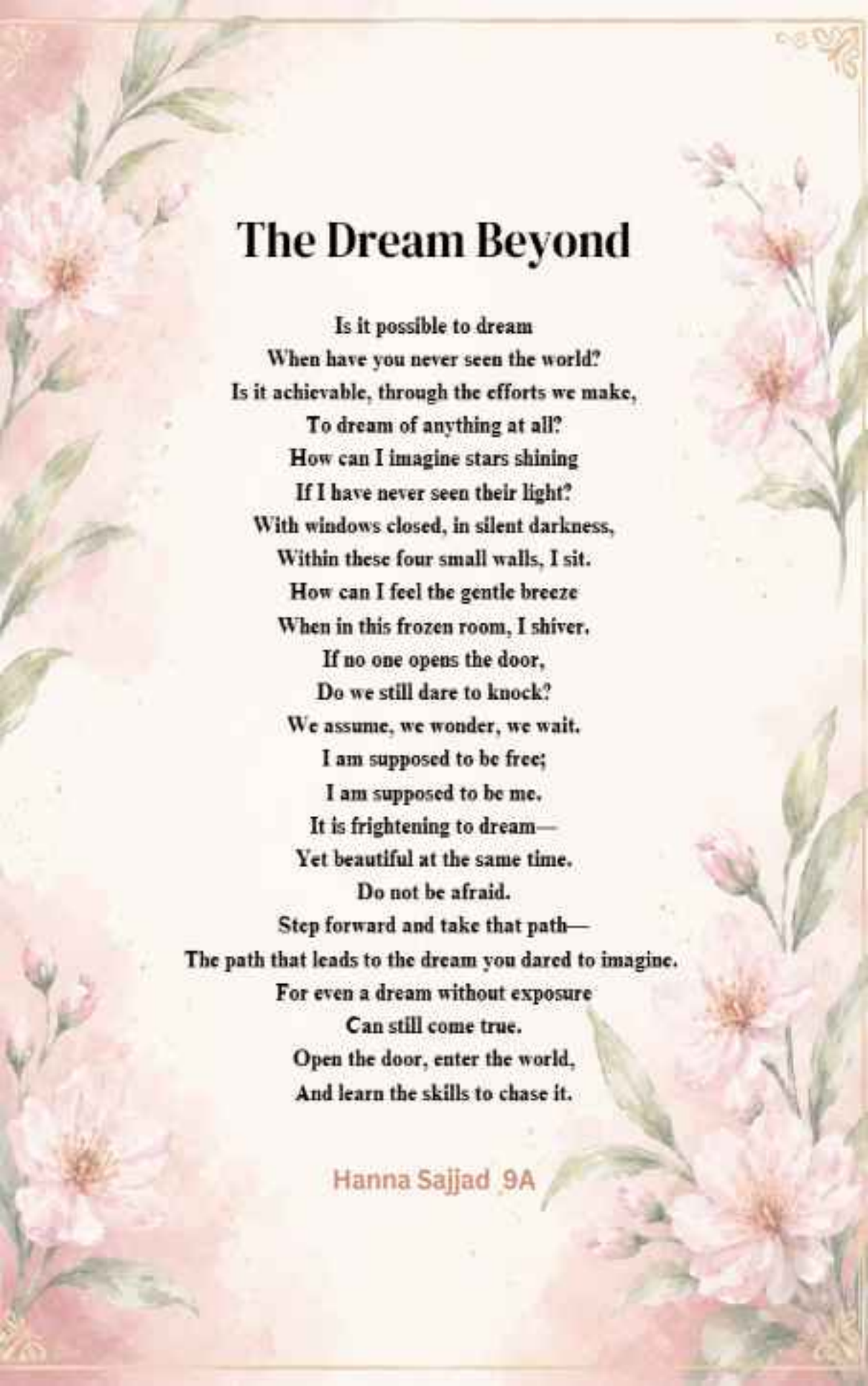

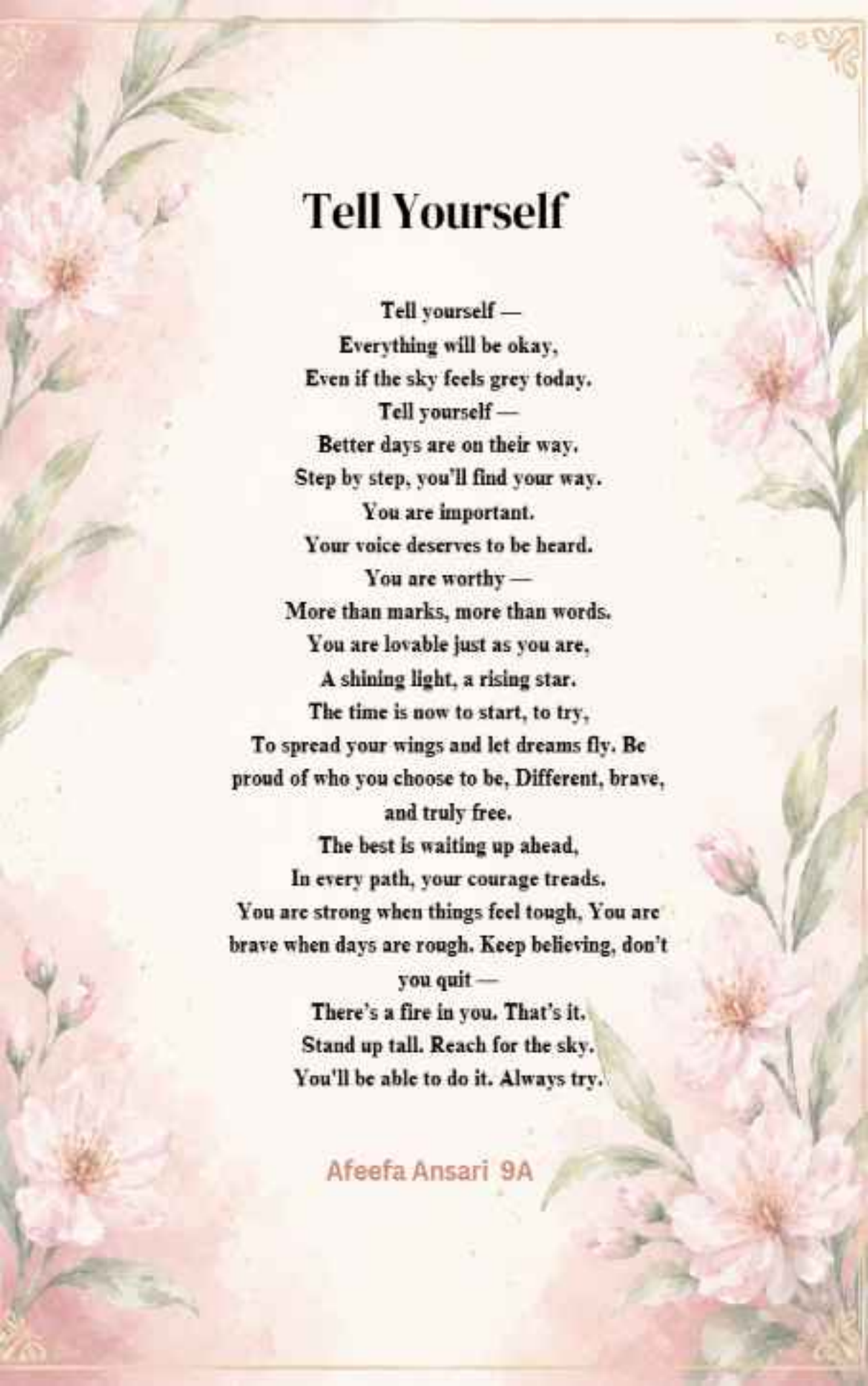

On Sunday, we visited the sanctuary one last time before heading home. I felt happy, lucky, and inspired.

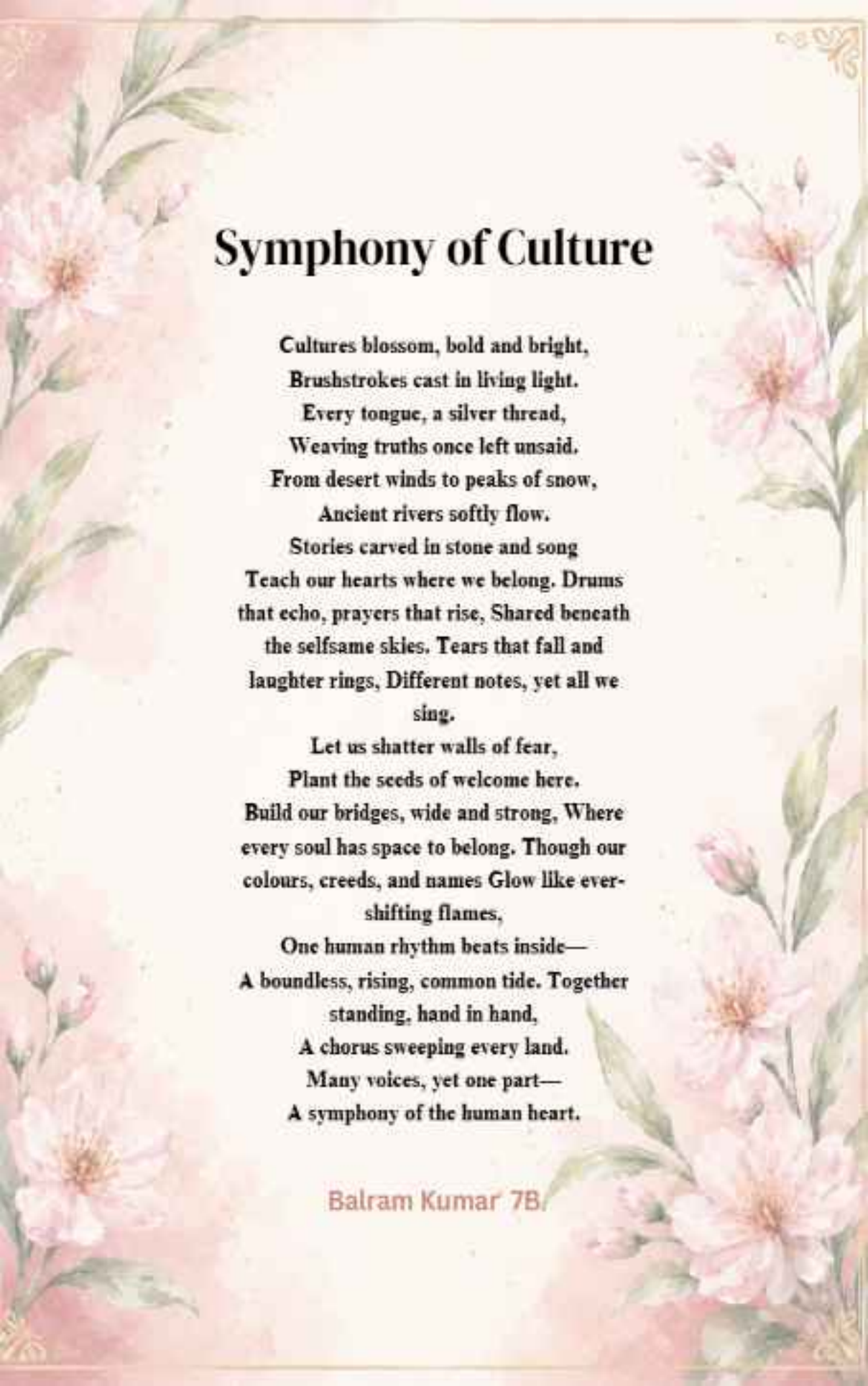

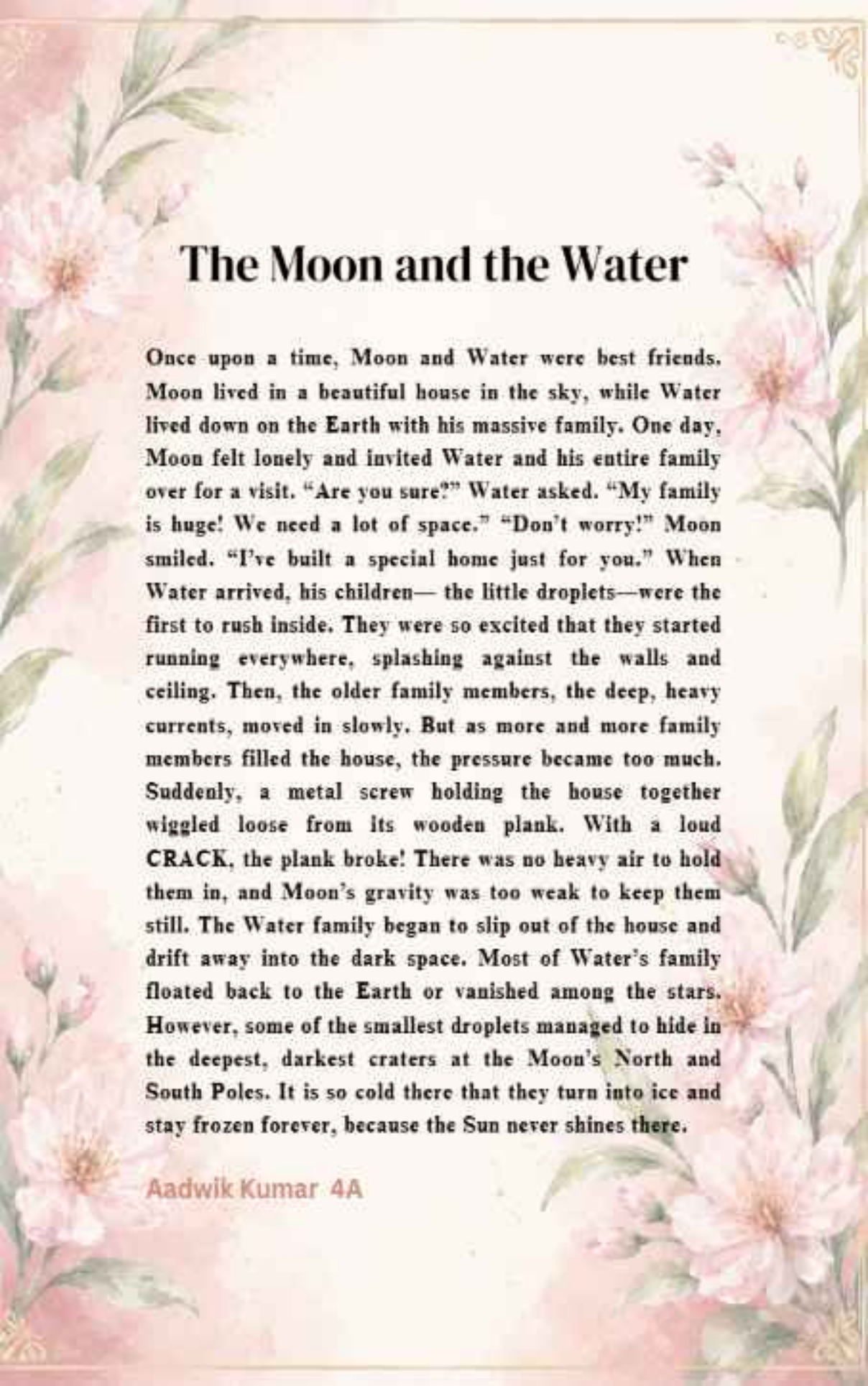

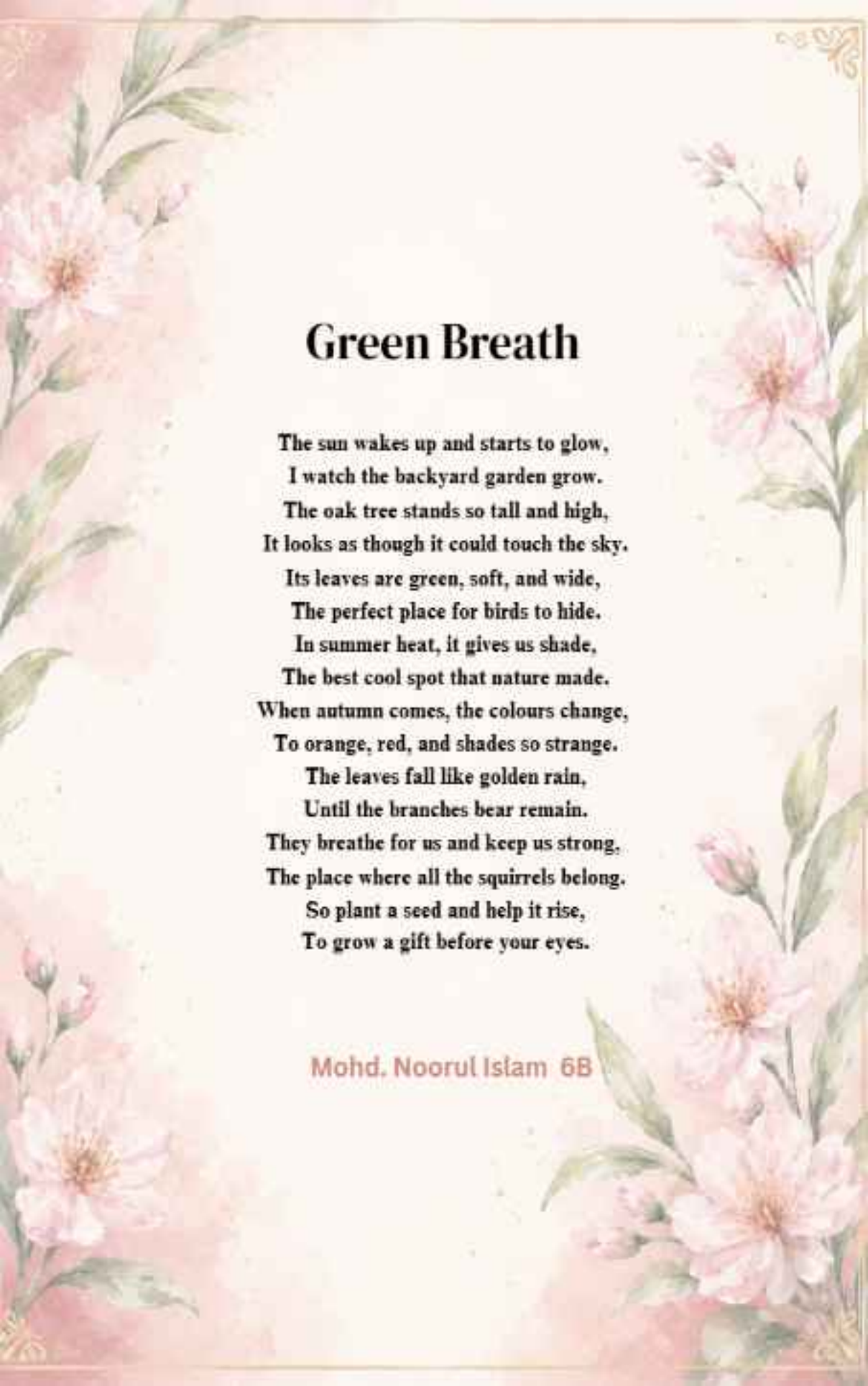

The Moon and the Water

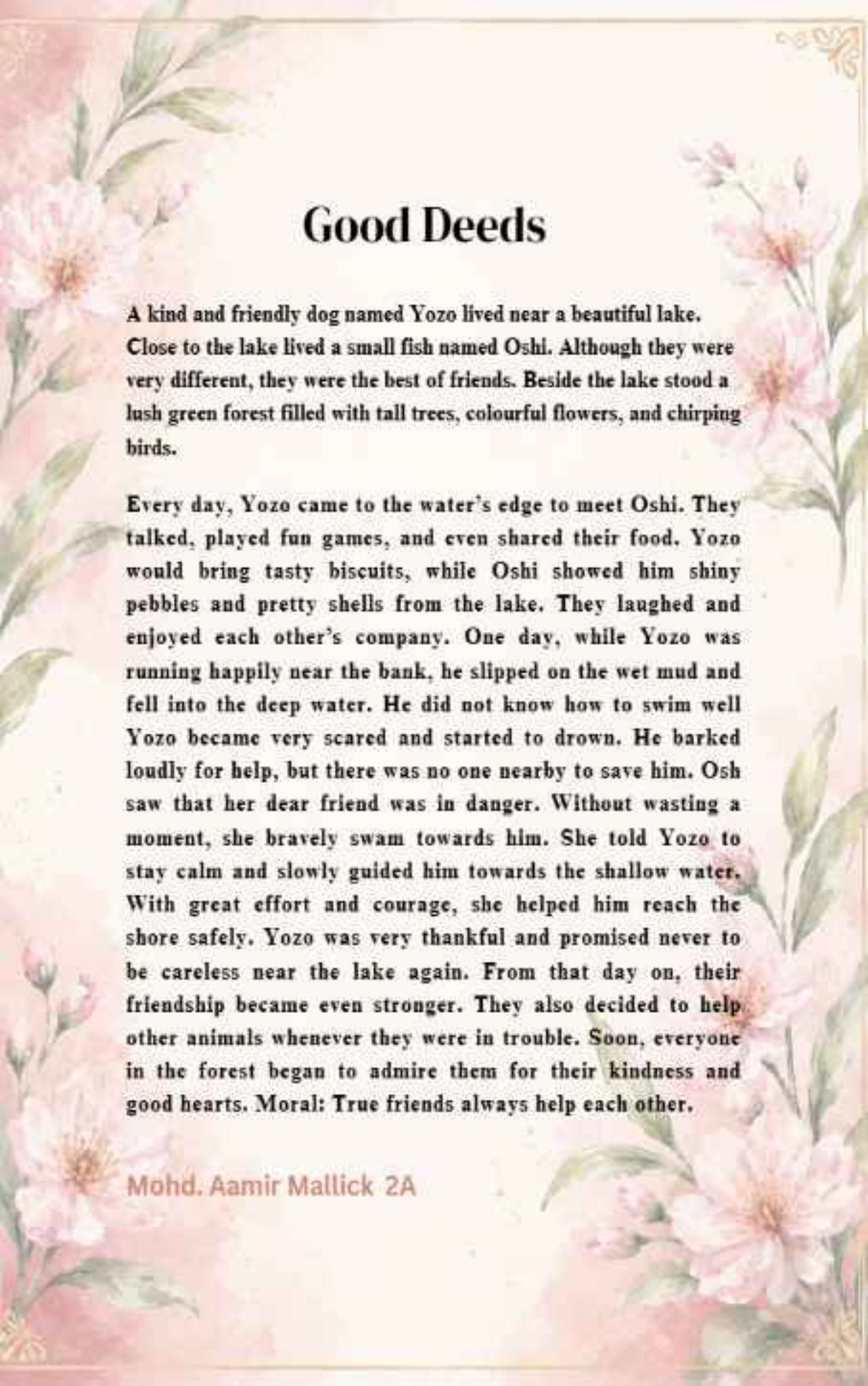

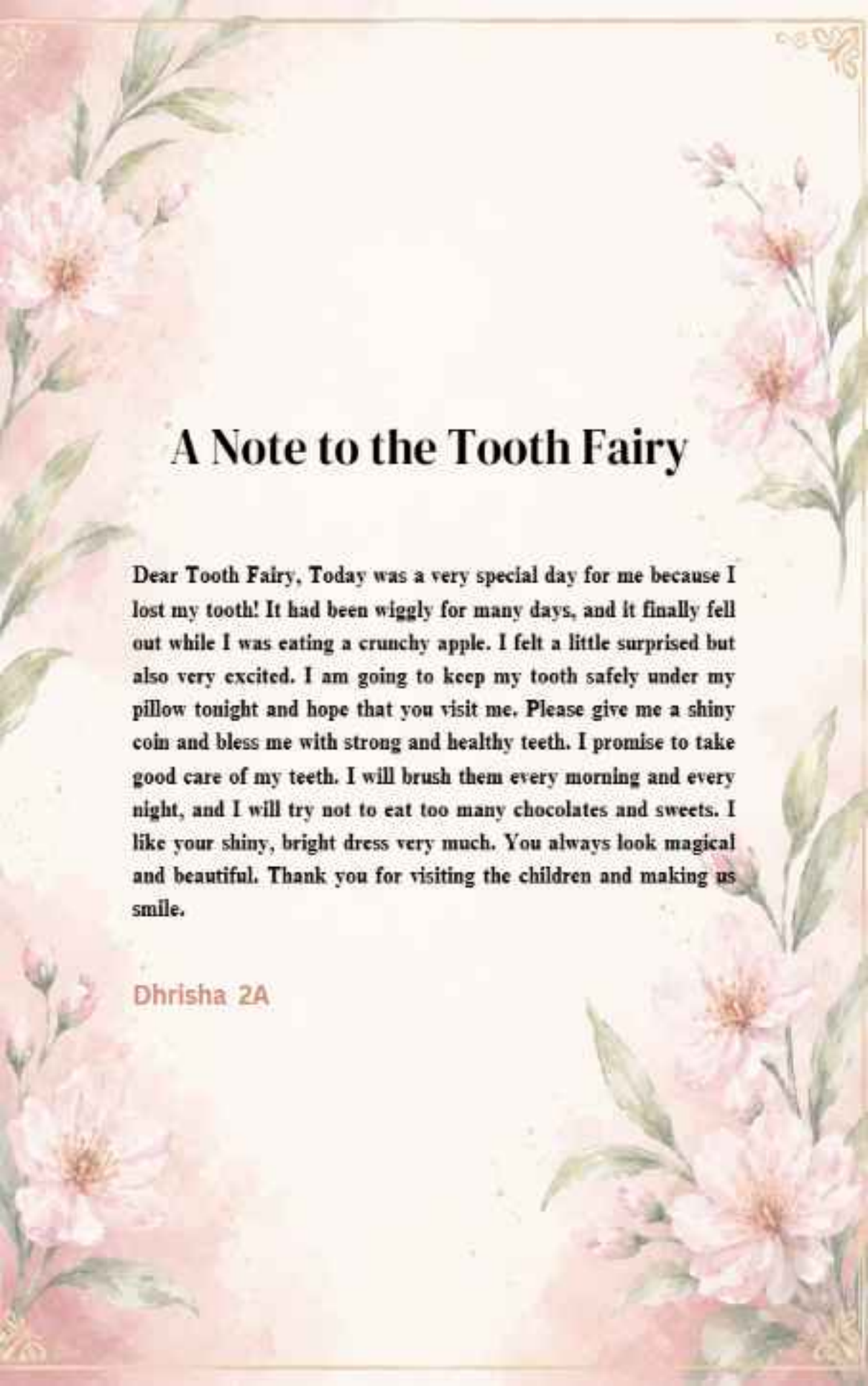


Good Deeds

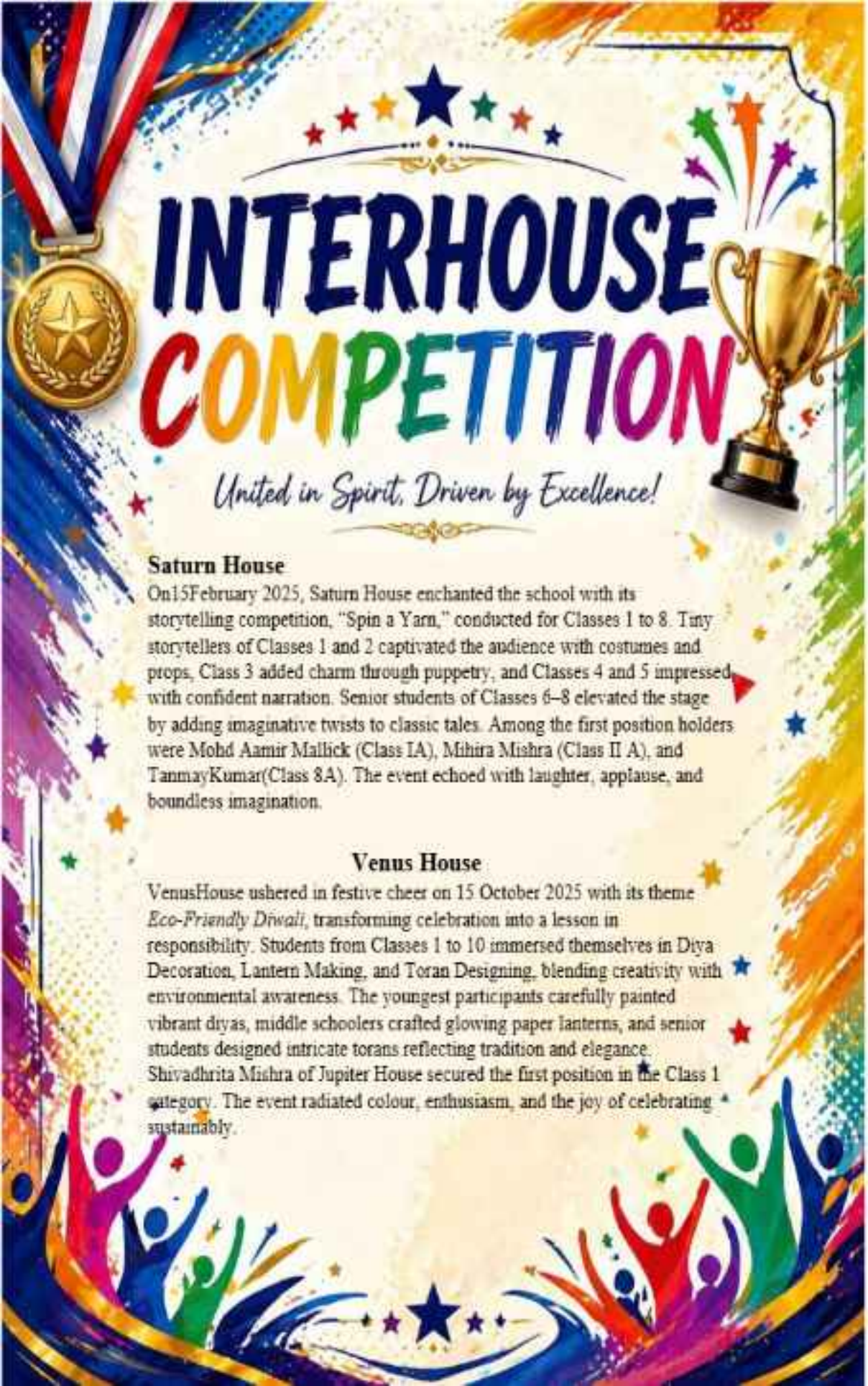
United in Spirit, Driven by Excellence!

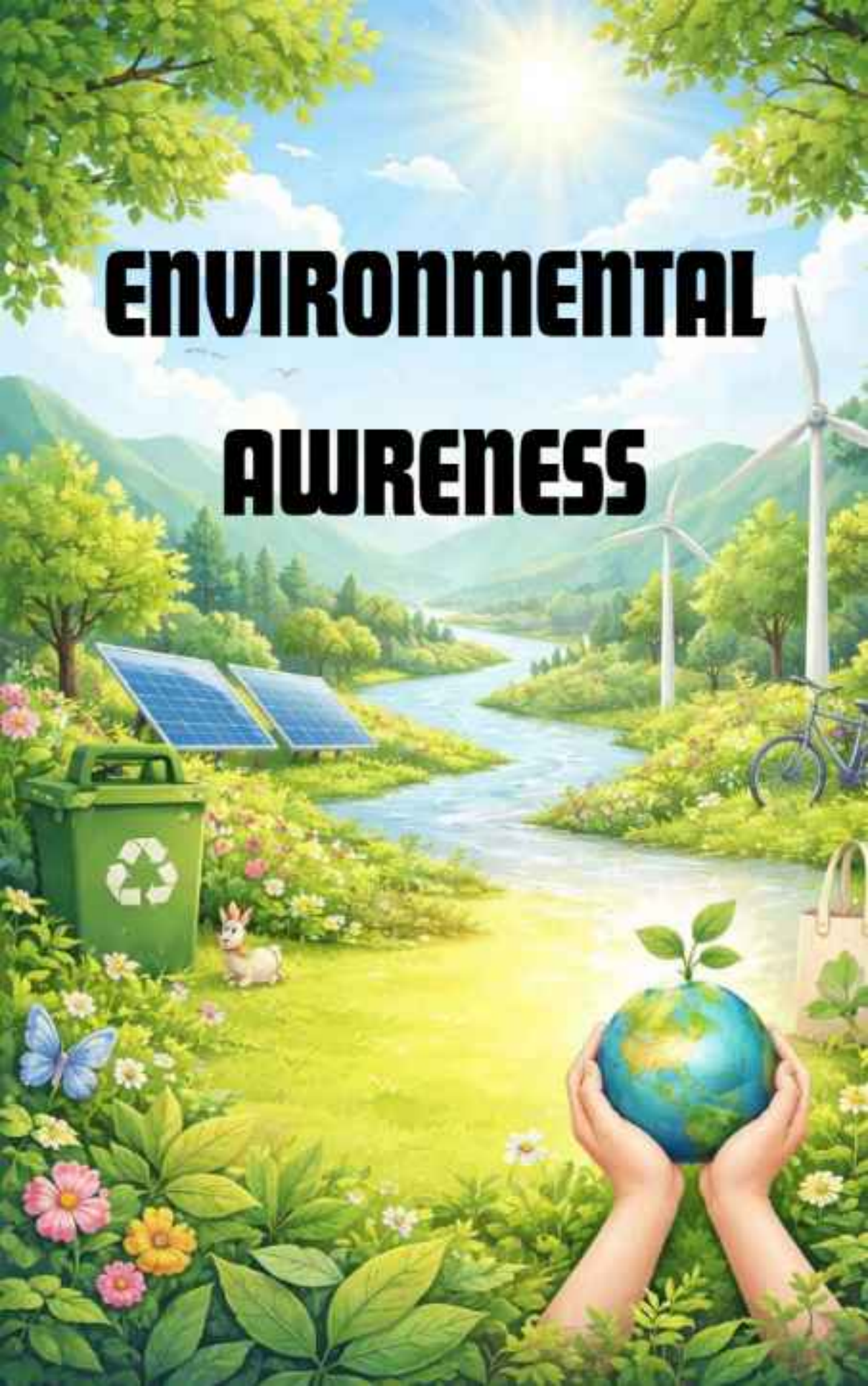

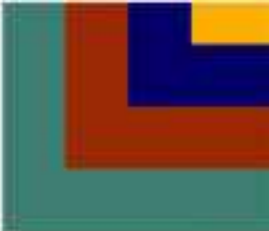
Activity 5

TEACHER'S WORKSHOPS

Oxford University Press workshop for Primary teachers

A highly engaging and informative workshop was conducted by Oxford University Press on 15 April 2025, specially curated for the teachers of Classes I to V, with a focus on empowering educators through modern teaching tools and pedagogical strategies. A core focus of the session was Oxford's Blended Learning and Competency-Based Learning frameworks, both of which align closely with the objectives of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020.



Workshop on Holistic Progress Card (HPC)

The workshop focused on the importance of assessments, challenges faced, the guidelines provided by the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 and stimulating activities to help educators understand HPC in a better way.

The educators delved into the issue of whether assessment is observable or non-observable. The session highlighted the common challenges which educators face in conducting assessments which included- limited resource and time, difficulty in assessing complex skills and competencies etc.

Several meaningful activities were conducted, including creating a sample HPC template, designing assessment tasks and rubrics, and developing a plan for implementing HPC in their respective schools.



CBSE Teacher Workshop on the National Curriculum Framework

On May 17th, School Principal Ms. Tania Joshi, a dynamic leader with over 30 years in education alongside co-resource person Ms. Sukhdeep Kaur, a respected innovator skilled at connecting with diverse students, led an inspiring workshop on the National Education Policy (NEP).

The session opened with NEP's evolution as a transformative framework for inclusive, holistic education, highlighting the National Curriculum Framework (NCF)'s clear guidelines for equity and development. Gender sensitization took center stage through powerful videos, demonstrating how fostering respect builds inclusive classrooms.

Teachers participated in a creative exercise, envisioning the school as a tech-forward space: interactive smart walls, sensory zones for young learners, virtual labs for immersive experiences, and tactile flooring for accessibility—all aligned with NEP's inclusivity goals.

Discussions emphasized blending traditional methods with technology for flexible learning, alongside strategies for emotional resilience and digital literacy to support student well-being. Teachers concluded by presenting interdisciplinary lessons tied to NEP objectives, showcasing holistic planning.

The workshop equipped educators to create future-ready classrooms, linking NCF and NEP visions for engaging, equitable learning.



Vector-Borne Diseases Workshop

On 22 May 2025, Md Abuzar, attended a training program on "Prevention and Control of Vector Borne Diseases" led by Dr. Tuli. The session educated participants on prevention strategies and mosquito breeding habitats to combat diseases like dengue and malaria.



Teacher workshop on Structured Classrooms

On May 22, 2025, Ms. Devaki Divan, a teacher engaged with the Teach for India mission in Mumbai. With hands-on experience teaching English, Maths, and Environmental Studies to students in classes 2 and 3, Ms. Divan brought with her a robust perspective of primary education.

The session highlighted Morning Meetings and Closing Circle Time to build community, set daily agendas, and encourage reflection, strengthening classroom bonds. Teachers explored Tracker and Reward Systems for positive behavior, goal-setting, and tracking progress, alongside Print-Rich Classrooms featuring charts, labels, and vocabulary walls to boost visual learning and engagement.

Skill-specific learning groups fostered peer collaboration and motivation, while Class Boards displayed agendas, objectives, and quotes to enhance focus and discipline. Interactive activities like the Spectrum Walk, real-life examples, and hands-on strategies—such as call-and-response techniques—equipped educators with practical tools.

The workshop ended with Exit Tickets capturing key insights, leaving teachers inspired to refine practices for better student outcomes. Ms. Divan received warm thanks for fostering an engaging space that advances primary education.



CBSE teacher workshop on Mental Wellness

A CBSE Capacity Building Programme titled “Promoting Mental Health and Wellness Among Students” was conducted on 27 June 2025 at The Indian School. The session was facilitated by two accomplished educators- Ms Tania Joshi, Principal of The Indian School, and Ms Nidhi Baghra. The programme focused on empowering educators with effective strategies to promote emotional well-being and foster supportive environments in schools. The workshop was attended by the teachers of our School.



Teacher workshop on Teaching Language and Storytelling

On September 11, 2025, eminent educators Mr. Ramanujam Meganathan (NCERT English Professor), Ms. Monisha Malik Sabharwal (award-winning innovator), and Ms. Nikita (progressive practitioner) led a dynamic workshop on language teaching and storytelling.

Session I featured engaging activities like a musical icebreaker, reflective sharing, and language games “The Farmer and the Goddess” for LRSW skills (Listening, Reading, Speaking, Writing), picture observations, meta-thinking, and spot-the-differences—emphasizing silent periods, vocabulary risks, and models like Chomsky’s LAD and the 5E’s (Engage, Explore, Explain, Elaborate, Evaluate).

Ms. Monisha's Session II used "The Best Nest" for creative vocabulary charts and word generation, showcasing stories' power to spark imagination, empathy, and linguistic growth. Recommended readings, including Nehru's works and "Teachers as Cultural Workers," rounded out the day.

The workshop blended theory, hands-on practice, and innovation, equipping teachers with reflective, learner-centered strategies for vibrant classrooms.



Teacher workshop- Fostering Positive Student Engagement

On November 26, 2025, a workshop on Fostering Positive Student Engagement was held, led by Counsellor Ms. Meghna Joshi and Psychologist Ms. Vrinda Bansal.

Teachers gained research-based strategies for proactive classroom management, including identifying triggers, co-creating agreements for student ownership, and using verbal de-escalation, reconnection conferences, and empathetic cues to promote self-regulation and reduce conflicts.

The session emphasized collaborative interventions, family involvement, behavior-tracking tools, inclusive activities, and regulation spaces to build supportive environments and align with school-wide social-emotional initiatives. Participants left equipped with step-by-step frameworks and resources to foster calmer, more engaging classrooms rooted in respect and teamwork.



STUDENT'S WORKSHOPS

Group Counselling Session on Examination Anxiety and Mental Health

A group counselling session was organised by School Counsellor, Ms Meghna Joshi, for class X to address the common struggles of examination anxiety and mental health challenges that often arise during the board examination period.

Students discovered how to reframe anxiety as usable energy rather than a foe to fight, since resistance often amplifies it. Ms. Joshi explained the fight-or-flight response's role in brain fog and procrastination, advising physical breaks like movement over forced studying to reset and regain focus, while noting moderate stress can sharpen performance when balanced with rest and self-care.

Existential insights encouraged viewing choices like stream selection as fluid, not fixed, redefining success through adaptation and learning from setbacks. Realistic "good enough" goals and personalized study plans foster efficiency, motivation, and well-being over perfectionism.

The session empowered students to embrace anxiety productively, blending practical tools with mindset shifts for resilient exam navigation.



Nurturing Boundaries, Honouring Consent: A Grade VI Emotional Literacy Session

On April 21, 2025, School Counsellor Ms. Meghna Joshi facilitated an engaging session on Consent and Boundaries for Class VI students, embedding emotional literacy into daily interactions.

Beyond basic "good touch-bad touch" lessons, students explored consent as an ongoing practice of respect and agency through relatable gifs, memes, and the Yes, No, Maybe game on everyday hugs. A Simpsons-inspired metaphor clarified that a clear, willing "yes" is essential—anything less means no—while boundaries emerged as flexible guides for physical, emotional, and energy needs, signaled by body cues like tension or safety.

Students practiced communicating limits clearly and seeking trusted adults when needed, reassured that assertiveness grows with practice. A take-home activity mapped personal safe zones and expression language, with teachers urged to continue discussions school-wide.

This proactive approach equips middle schoolers to navigate peer pressure confidently, fostering a culture of emotional safety and mutual respect.



IIIT Delhi Open House

The Indraprastha Institute of Information Technology, New Delhi hosted the "IIIT Delhi Open House" for B.Tech aspirants on 24 May, 2025. The purpose of the visit was to familiarise attendees with the institute's infrastructure, facilities, research culture, and academic ethos through first-hand observation and direct interaction with faculty and student representatives. A total of 18 students from our school attended the event, accompanied by their teachers, Ms Anupriya, Mohd Abuzar, and Mr Karmendra, whose guidance added valuable context through the visit.



Science Exhibition and Workshop

On 28th July 2025, students from Years 6–10 attended the National Science Exhibition at Galgotias University, exploring projects in robotics, renewable energy, and biotechnology, which inspired creativity and broadened their scientific perspective.



The Citizenship Programme initiates POCSO Awareness Session for classes 8, 9 and 10

On August 2, 2025, Our school hosted a compelling session on the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act for Classes VIII, IX, and X, featuring Supreme Court advocates Ms. Nidhi Khanna and Ms. Aishani Narain.

Ms. Khanna clarified that Indian law deems anyone under 18 incapable of consent, making any sexual act with a minor reportable under POCSO. She shared case stories to dismantle cultural shame barriers, highlighting child-friendly reporting as an empowering ally rather than a punitive system.

Ms. Narain focused on the right to say no, stressing that temporary discomfort should never compromise dignity or confidence. Drawing from her constitutional casework, she presented POCSO as a personal safeguard for voice, self-trust, and respect.

Students' probing questions on rural-urban gaps and adult dismissals sparked lively dialogue, transforming legal facts into everyday rights. The session instilled dignity, agency, and courage, positioning POCSO as a vital promise for every child.



Classes 6-10 interact with a senior Meteorologist on Climate Change

On August 21, 2025, our school hosted an insightful session on "Climate Change: Insight into Weather and Environment" for Classes 6-10, led by Mr. Anand Sharma, Senior Meteorologist at the India Meteorological Department and President of the Indian Meteorological Society.

Mr. Sharma explained how air pressure, wind speed, cloud movements, air moisture, and density differences shape daily weather, while Earth's magnetic field protects against solar radiation. He guided students to reliable forecasts via the official Government of India meteorological website, stressing credible sources.

In response to queries, he detailed global warming's role in shifting patterns and intensifying extreme events like erratic monsoons and temperature swings.



Self-Defence Workshop for classes III to V by Delhi Police

On September 16, 2025, a Self-Defence Workshop was conducted in the auditorium for Classes III to V, welcoming students from both morning and evening shifts. Delhi Police District South Head Constables Ms. Asha and Ms. Suchitra led the session with expertise.
